
## **Community Housing Support & Investments**

InterCommunity Health Network Coordinated Care Organization (IHN-CCO) invests in the housing sector through community-driven projects led by equity-focused organizations. Over \$4 million was invested in housing between 2014 and 2022 in the areas of permanent supportive housing, respite care, and increased resource navigation support in shelters and communities.

# Social Determinants of Health / Addressing Root Causes

Understanding the complex nature of the housing crisis, IHN-CCO is committed to funding programs that meet members where they are at while focusing on the long-term goal of reducing health inequities.

IHN-CCO Social Determinant of Health Spending Breakdown by Category, 2014-2022

- Faith Communities Engaging
   Health: Faith Community Health Network, \$98,010
   Supporting FCHN nurses in community health, health coaching, and resource navigation among the unhoused populations engaging with faith community supports.
- Service Integration Team in East Linn County: IHN-CCO developed and funds a Service Integration Team in Linn County. The Service Integration Team is a community collaboration that supports navigation to individual needs related to addressing SDoH.
- Coalition for Housing Equity: information sharing collaborative built on equity to develop recommendations for an IHN-CCO housing benefit, establish regional funding strategies, and connect systems in all sectors that impact housing, including governmental, healthcare, businesses, community-based organizations, and more.

### **Supporting at Risk Members and Moving to Permanent Supportive Housing**


Recognizing the complexity of our housing crisis, IHN-CCO is dedicated to building sustainable programs supporting resource navigation and increased access to culturally responsive services by addressing members' health related social needs.

- Permanent Supportive Housing Respite and Housing Case Management: Corvallis Housing First, \$145,036
   Establish and integrate frameworks for sustainable PSH programming through Traditional Health Worker billing pathways.
- **Healthy Homes Together**: Albany Partnership for Housing, \$95,480 Increase access to Traditional Health Worker support in accessible housing to support residents at risk of eviction through service and resource navigation.

#### **Emergency Supports**

Acknowledging the need for immediate, responsive services IHN-CCO has invested in community based flexible programming to meet short term needs while supporting members to access longer term solutions.

- Emergency Hotel Sheltering: Unity Shelter, \$110,000 Expand existing emergency sheltering programming to include supportive staffing and additional room nights.
- Care Hub Respite: Samaritan Health Services Care Hub, \$90,000
  Manage the provision of respite and recuperative beds for individuals leaving in-patient medical services who are unable to access
- Wellness Care Team: Family Assistance and Resource Center Group, \$237,360 Support the provision of individualized care through street outreach and outreach at the FAC micro-shelter and navigation site in Sweet Home.

IHN-CCO was formed in 2012 by local public, private, and non-profit partners to unify health services and systems for Medicaid members in Benton, Lincoln, and Linn Counties. IHN-CCO is committed to improving the health of our communities by coordinating a regional effort towards meeting the Quadruple Aim of better health, better care, lower cost, and improved provider satisfaction. IHN-CCO has approximately 75,000 members on the plan on the average day and serves over 80,000 per year.
